"According to Mr. Bernard Pauls, resident at Sunningdale, Sask., the documents listing Hoeppner's goods were discovered on the farm of Hoeppner's heirs, which they had bought in 1905 or 1907 and possessed until 1917. This farm is located on Chortitza Island on the Dnieper. Mrs. Pauls wrote that most of the goods were bought by two Russian noblemen, Ivanenko and Micklashevidii, besides others, who returned most of them to Jacob Hoeppner when he was released from prison after a year, when amnesty was granted upon the ascension of a new monarch. For a while Jacob Hoeppner and wife operated a cheese/soap? factory on the estate of the nobleman, Micklashevidii. His estate was 10 miles from Nieder Chortitza.

The Deputy Jacob was expelled from his congregation which led to his becoming the first registered Mennonite resident of Alexandrovsk. His Ukrainian neighbours sought to alleviate his financial distress in numerous ways."
